- I. Read a fiction or non-fiction book.
- 2. Think of a theme or a scene from the book that you want to focus on.
- 3. Make a list of items that are related to this theme or scene.
- 4. Draw these items on a piece of paper, color them, and cut them out.
- 5. You can also find magazine pictures that illustrate these items and cut them out.



- Create a background collage with these images on a piece of colored or construction paper and glue it to the inside of the box.
- 7. Punch holes on the tops of the pictures that you want to hang, tie them to a piece of string, and tape them to the roof of the box.
- 8. Close the flaps of the box and seal them with tape.
- 9. Add any other decorations you want to the inside and outside of the box.
- 10. Share your favorite part of your diorama with your classmates.







